<u>EARTHQUAKE SAFETY</u>

Be Prepared

Earthquake Warning Signs:

You may possibly feel and/or hear an unusual sound just before a quake hits. It will sound or feel like a train is coming at you. Seconds later the ground will begin to move, either shaking, moving back and forth (like a boat), or rolling. The motion will last for seconds but rarely minutes. After the main quake you may feel frequent but lesser quakes (aftershocks). Aftershocks can occur minutes, hours or even days following a major quake and decrease with time.

What Should You Do?

- Drop down; take cover under a desk or table and hold on.
- Stay indoors until the shaking stops and you're sure it's safe for you to exit.
- Stay away from bookcases or furniture that is likely to fall.
- Stay away from windows. In a high-rise building, expect fire alarms and sprinkler systems to go off.
- If you are in bed, hold on and stay there, protecting your head with a pillow.
- If you are outdoors, find a clear spot away from buildings, trees, and power lines. Drop to the ground.
- If you are in a car, slow down and drive to a clear place. Stay in the car until the shaking stops.

What Should You Prepare?

- Locate a place in each room of the house that you can go to in case of an earthquake. It should be a spot where nothing is likely to fall on you.
- Keep a supply of canned food, an up-to-date first aid kid, 3 gallons (11.4 liters) of water per person, dust masks and goggles, and a working battery-operated radio and flashlights.
- Know how to turn off gas and water mains.

CAUTION!

DO NOT LIGHT A FLAME, MATCH OR LIGHTER UNTIL YOU ARE TOLD THAT IT IS SAFE TO DO SO. Other extensive damages can be caused by gas fires after an earthquake. Gas lines may be

broken!

<u>Communications</u>: Cellular telephone networks may become over-tasked. In that case text using SMS to communicate with emergency services or family and friends.

*Tip: to check your residence for a gas leak, locate your gas meter and check the dials on the front. If the dials are spinning, you have a gas leak. Call **911** immediately and vacate the premises.

To apply for a driver's license, you will need one of the following:

- Canadian Passport/Birth Certificate/ I-94
- NATO Passport/ Birth Certificate/ I-94
- Foreign Passport with I-94

We recommend you make an appointment online for all DMV services to avoid the long wait: **It is mandatory, however, to make an appointment for the driving test.** There are handbooks on the DMV website dmv.ca.gov and are available in various languages.

Obtaining a California Driver's License is strongly recommended. If you choose not to obtain one, you must have a valid license that will not expire during your stay from your home country.

You must always have your license, car registration and proof of insurance on you/ in your vehicle at all times.

Before Making a purchase:

- Check car value by checking <u>www.kellybluebook.com</u> (Free) or <u>www.carfax.com</u> for a small cost. This will give information about previous car accidents, etc.
- Consider having a basic free pre-purchase inspection done by a mechanic. NTPS can help you locate an automotive shop that will offer this service.

NTPS Cars: Students driving NTPS vehicles must have a valid driver's license (preferably CA). This includes spouses. Check with the school before any family members drive NTPS Vehicles. The car mileage needs to be reported EVERY Monday to Ops and/or the front office.

Car Registration

- If you buy a car from a dealership, registration should be included in your purchase.
- If you buy from a private party, the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) allows ten (10) days to transfer ownership, as the buyer.
- DMV allows five (5) days to report the transfer of a car sale.
- Complete the title transfer with assistance from <u>www.dmv.ca.gov</u> or by visiting the DMV in Lancaster. Make an appointment, your wait will be shorter!

Car Safety Laws

Child Car Seats

Children under the age of 8 or under 4'9" must be secured in the rear seat of a vehicle in an appropriate car seat or booster seat. Children must remain rear facing until they weigh 40 pounds or more or are at least 40 inches tall.

General Seat Belt Laws

With a few exceptions, everyone riding in a car must be contained by an approved safety-restraint system (seat belts and/or safety seats). Some passengers may be exempt from this requirement due to medical issues if they have a letter from their doctor excusing them from the seat belt law.

Passengers who are at least 16 years of age can be cited for failing to comply with the law. Drivers are responsible for their own conduct along with their passenger's behavior and can be cited for any seat belt violation that occurs within their vehicle.

Cell Phones

AT&T, Sprint, Verizon, and T-Mobile are located throughout Lancaster, Palmdale, and Tehachapi. Check online for locations.

Be sure to read ALL paperwork when buying cell phones. Watch for any 2-year contract terms as most cell phone agreements require a 2-year minimum. A pay-as-you-go phone may be the best option. Wal-Mart and Best Buy are great to check for these and they also have all carriers.

Cell Phone Laws

Drivers are required to use hands-free equipment while talking on their cellular telephones. You can stay in compliance by purchasing a hands-free kit.

Texting and driving also falls under this law.

If you do not have a hands-free device, it's best to stay off your phone while driving.

Driving Tips

- 1. ATTENTION: Many stop lights have cameras. If you drive through a red light, do not make a "complete stop" or if you stop in the crosswalk before a right turn, you may get a traffic ticket in the mail.
- 2. Pedestrians and bicycles ALWAYS have the right of way, let them go first.
- 3. ALWAYS use "Directional Signals" for right or left turns or pulling away from a curb. Signal in advance of your turn.
- 4. MERGE: into oncoming traffic at a constant but safe rate of speed and as soon as moving traffic will allow, safety enter the lane. DO NOT STOP IN A MERGE LANE!
- 5. SCAN: for other traffic at all times while you are driving or while you are waiting at a traffic signal or preparing to make a turn. Always check your mirror and be a cautious driver.
- 6. STOP SIGNS and RED LIGHTS: No left turns on red lights, right turns must yield to oncoming traffic and pedestrians! Your car must come to a full and complete stop behind the crosswalk lines.
- 7. CHANGING LANES: To change from one driving lane to another you MUST turn on the directional signal in advance. Look in the rear-view mirror and side mirrors for traffic that is behind or beside you. Also, look over your shoulder, as cars may be in your bling spot.
- TURNING WHEN YOU HAVE A GREEN LIGHT: Right Turns- Turn on the signal, scan intersections and sidewalks before you begin your turn. NEVER COME TO A COMPLETE STOP AT A GREEN LIGHT—UNLESS THERE IS TRAFFIC OR A PEDESTRIAN IN YOUR TURN LANE. Left Turns- Turn on signal, make sure road is clear, and double check for traffic or pedestrians.
- 9. TURNING ONTO ANOTHER STREET WITHOUT A TRAFFIC LIGHT: When you make turns without a traffic light, you do NOT have the right of way, oncoming traffic does.
- 10. DRIVING SPEED: Always look for the speed limit signs in your driving area. School zones, school crosswalks and housing areas are 25 mph. Bling intersections, alleys and railroads are 15 mph. Business districts and residential areas are 25 mph. Most city streets are 35-40 mph, check signs. Highways and Freeways are usually 60-70 mph, check signs. Drive at the same rate of speed as other vehicles. The right lane is reserved for slower traffic, left lane for passing.
- 11. TURNING AT A BUSY INTERSECTION: You can move your car to the center of the intersection and prepare to "turn left" as soon as other traffic stops. NEVER STOP IN THE CENTER OF THE INTERSECTION SO THAT YOU BLOCK OTHER TRAFFIC FROM MOVING.
- 12. BIKE LANE: Look for the designated bike lanes. Do not drive into the bike lane. If the bike lane turns a corner, make sure that when you turn the corner you do not cross over the bike lane. Enter the bike lane only when the white line is "broken". The only time you may enter a bike lane is when making a right hand turn, use signal and merge just before making the turn, after you check for people using the bike lane.

- 13. Driving during Holidays: Major roads and highways will be very crowded during and around the holidays. Use caution and add extra hours into your driving time.
- 14. Driving on wet roads: Is very dangerous, reduce speeds! Roads become slippery when wet, especially within the first few hours of the storm.
- 15. Driving on wet roads in cold weather: Very dangerous. A transparent coating of ice can form on the road, called black ice. Be very cautious and go very slowly.
- 16. Parking: Do not park your car on a street when your car is facing in the opposite direction of traffic. You will be fined!

What if You get Pulled Over?

What to Do When You Get Pulled Over by the Police

- 1. Acknowledge the officer by turning on flashers.
- 2. Pull over to a safe area.
- 3. Stay in the car.
- 4. Turn off the engine, roll down window, and turn on your dome lights.
- 5. Stay calm.
- 6. Stay still and keep your hands on the steering wheel.
- 7. If you plan on fighting your ticket, keep answers short and don't directly admit wrongdoing.
- 8. Sometimes, saying "I'm sorry" works.
- 9. Wait for the officer to ask for your documents.
- 10. Move deliberately.
- 11. If you're carrying a gun, let the officer know.
- 12. Return hands to the steering wheel.
- 13. Be civil.
- 14. You don't have to consent to a search.
- 15. Don't argue.
- 16. Sign the citation.
- 17. Be safe when merging back into traffic.
- 1. Acknowledge the officer by turning on flashers. To let the officer know that you've seen his lights and that you plan on pulling over, turn on your emergency flashers. This is a good idea if you think you'll need to drive a distance before you can find a safe place to pull over.
- 2. Pull over to a safe area. Typically, you want to pull over to the right side of the road. When looking for a spot to pull over to, think "safety first" for both you and the officer. Look for an area with a wide shoulder so passing traffic isn't a hazard. If it's dark outside, look for a place that's well-lit if possible. That will help put the officer at ease. Parking lots and well-lit side streets are other safe places to pull over to.

If you need to travel a short distance to pull over, do so at a slower pace than you normally drive. You don't want the officer to think you're trying to make a getaway. Also, if you need to cross multiple lanes to pull over to the right-hand side of the road, do so safely.

- 3. **Stay in the car.** If you get out of the car as soon as you stop, it may give the impression to the officer that you're going to be aggressive, or you have something to hide in the car. It is best to stay seated until instructed otherwise.
- 4. Turn off the engine, roll down window, and turn on your dome lights. As soon as you come to a stop, turn off your engine and roll down your window. If it's dark out, turn on your dome light so the officer can see what's going on inside the vehicle as he approaches.
- 5. **Stay calm.** It's common to get amped up whenever you get pulled over. Take some deep breaths and relax. If it helps, it's good to remind yourself that the officer is probably nervous too.
- 6. **Stay still and keep your hands on the steering wheel.** Keep your hands resting on the wheel and remain still as the officer approaches your vehicle. You don't want to give the officer any reason to believe you're a threat.
- 7. If you plan on fighting your ticket, keep answers short and don't directly admit wrongdoing. Everything you say to an officer is admissible in court, so if you plan on fighting your ticket, do not say anything that indicates you are guilty. Officers will typically ask questions to get some sort of admission out of you when they first walk up to your window. For example, "Do you know why I pulled you over?" Don't say, "I was speeding, sir." Simply say, "No" or, "I don't know."
- 8. **Sometimes, saying "I'm sorry" works.** If clearly in violation (speeding, failing to stop at a red light, etc.), apologize to the officer, "My apologies officer, I'll try to pay more attention in the future."
- 9. Wait for the officer to ask for your documents. Don't try to expedite the process by getting your license and registration ready while the officer approaches your car. The officer may think you are reaching for a gun or trying to hide some sort of incriminating evidence. Wait until the officer approaches the window and asks for your documents.
- 10. Move deliberately. When you do reach to get your license and registration, do so deliberately. A quick reach into the glove compartment for your insurance paperwork looks the same as a quick reach into your glove compartment for a weapon. If your wallet is in a bag in your backseat, let the officer know before you turn around and look for it. Quick Tip: Try to keep your glove compartment relatively organized, and your documents together, so that when you pull the box open, you don't have to frantically sort through 20-year-old maps and wads of receipts to find your registration.
- 11. If you're carrying a gun, let the officer know. Some states have laws that require concealed carry owners to inform officers that they're carrying a gun anytime they get pulled over. These are called "must inform" states. Officers are allowed to ask for and hold the weapon for the duration of the stop.

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Even if you don't live in a "must inform" state, as a courtesy to the officer, you might want to disclose the fact that you're carrying. Nothing puts an officer on red alert like seeing an outline of a gun through a motorist's clothes.

- 12. **Return hands to the steering wheel.** After you've handed the officer your paperwork, return your hands to the steering wheel. You always want to keep your hands visible to the officer.
- 13. **Be civil.** Be polite and respectful in your communications with the officer. Although you may not be happy to get a ticket, calling the officer names, threatening, and being rude won't get you anywhere. In fact, it could make things worse.
- 14. You don't have to consent to a search. In order to search your vehicle without your consent, an officer needs probable cause. If the officer doesn't have probable cause but wants to search your car anyway, they'll need your consent and may ask you something like, "You don't mind me taking a look in your car, do you?" Even if you haven't done anything illegal, it's usually a good idea to decline the search. While you may believe you have nothing to hide, you never know with certainty what has fallen under seats. Politely decline the search by saying, "I don't consent to a search, officer."
- 15. **Don't argue.** The side of the road is not the place to argue for a ticket. If you want to contest the ticket, you can do so in court and in front of a judge.
- 16. Sign the citation. If the officer decides to issue a citation, he'll ask you to sign it. Sign it. It's not an admission of guilt, it's just recognition that you've received the citation and that you promise to either 1) pay the fine or 2) show up to court on the designated date. If you refuse to sign the ticket, the officer can take you to jail.
- 17. **Be safe when merging back into traffic.** Take your time to store your belongings before you re-enter traffic. If you're upset, collect yourself before driving away. When you're ready, turn on your signal and merge back into traffic.

Amusement Parks:

1. Disneyland and Disney California Adventure Park.

Begin with a walk down Main Street and end with the fireworks-filled parade and laser light shows that happen every evening. Don't miss Mr. Toad's Wild Ride and spend another day next door at Disney's California Adventure Park, where Pixar characters rule. And as of May 2019, the Force will be with the Mouse, as the much-anticipated Star Wars: Galaxy's Edge section of Disneyland opens. For a behind-the-scenes look at both the parks, book an Adventures by Disney trip and you'll get lots of insider experiences.

2. Knott's Berry Farm: <u>www.knotts.com</u> Knott's Berry Farm is a world-renowned theme park built from the humblest of beginnings. What started as a small berry farm soon began to grow into a family theme park destination thanks to famous fried chicken dinners, boysenberries, and an Old West Ghost Town. Knott's Berry Farm now bursts with attractions and entertainment for all ages, including first-class roller coasters, stage shows, interactive experiences, delicious food creations and family-friendly fun

featuring Snoopy and the Peanuts Gang. The once small family farm has grown into today's family fun destination; home to the Knott's Berry Farm theme park, Knott's Soak City Waterpark and Knott's Berry Farm Hotel.

- 3. Legoland California: www.legoland.com/california Come play your part at LEGOLAND[®] California Resort, located just 30 minutes north of San Diego and one hour south of Anaheim. With more than 60 rides, shows and attractions, it's an interactive, hands-on theme park experience for families with children 2 12. The Resort is also home to SEA LIFE[®] Aquarium and the world's first LEGOLAND[®] Water Park. And if you've ever dreamed of spending the night at LEGOLAND, LEGOLAND Hotel and LEGOLAND Castle Hotel at the Resort are open and less than 2 miles from the nearest beach!
- 4. Santa Monica Pier: www.santamonicapier.org Santa Monica Pier, the place that first comes to most people's minds when they think of Santa Monica. It's a long, wide pier that is packed with fun things to do. A roller coaster, Ferris wheel and other rides await, colorfully curling against the skyline and providing a lit-up atmosphere at night. Carnival-style games also line the pier along with carnival foods and other eateries. There are plenty of souvenir shops, too, at this great family spot. And be sure to bring bathing suits, towels, and sand toys as well, since the beach and ocean beckon right below the famous pier. Spend the whole day here and we guarantee that your kids will sleep like babies by the time you arrive back home.
- 5. Plus, there are family and kids' rides, too; nighttime shows featuring laser lights and live music; and the Looney Tunes characters can be found throughout the park. - 6. Universal Studios. www.universalstudioshollywood.com Universal Studios is the real thing, a working movie studio that also happens to have a theme park attached to it. Which means visitors get the chance to go right onto the lot to see where some of their favorite movies and television shows are made -- think the "Psycho" house, the "Desperate Housewives" neighborhood, the "Back to the Future" town square and much more. Take the Studio Tour for unique insights into how Hollywood really works. Stay for the rest of the rides there too, including the Fast and Furious Supercharged, Transformers The Ride 3D, WaterWorld, Despicable Me Minion Mayhem, and be sure to

allow lots of time to see everything The Wizarding World of Harry Potter has to offer, too. Some of the newer additions are Jurassic World: The Ride, for dinosaur lovers of all ages, and Mario Kart: Bowser's Challenger, to experience the racing game in real life!

Beaches: There are many beaches for a day trip from the Antelope Valley. Whether you want the relatively quiet beaches of Ventura, or the more famous and crowded beaches of Long Beach, Malibu, Manhattan, and Venice Beach there are many options.

Hikes: There are many fun hikes in the local area and within a day trip. They range from easy to strenuous. Whether you want to hike through the windmills above Mojave or see the city from the HOLLYWOOD sign there are many options. - 1. Lake Arrowhead: www.lakearrowhead.com Nestled in the majestic mountains of the San Bernardino National Forest, widely known as "The Alps of Southern California," is the best kept secret on the West Coast Lake Arrowhead. A stunningly beautiful, cozy, and quaint mountain resort paradise, Lake Arrowhead features countless outdoor recreational activities such as hiking, backpacking, bicycling, water and snow skiing, fishing, and much more. With the stunning scenery and wildlife comes a natural peacefulness that has lured people to these mountains for centuries.
- Big Bear: www.bigbear.com Big Bear Lake is Southern California's four-season mountain lake escape. Located in the heart of Southern California - and close to Phoenix and Las Vegas - Big Bear Lake is the jewel of the San Bernardino National Forest and known for excellent fishing, snowboarding & skiing, hiking, mountain biking and so much more.
- 3. **Castaic Lake:** <u>www.castaiclake.com</u> Several State, National and <u>World record fish</u> were caught a Castaic Lake. Castaic Lake is the largest state water project reservoir in Southern California, and contains over 11,200 total acres of parkland and open space habitat. Castaic Lake has two bodies of water. Lower lake is for non-power boating and canoeing. Swimming season on lower lake runs from mid-May to mid-September. Upper lake is for sailing, power boating, water and jet skiing, and fishing. The lake is stocked with bass, trout, and catfish. Boat rentals and a tackle bait shop are available.
- 4. Lake Piru: <u>www.californiasgreatestlakes.com/piru/lake_piru.html</u> Lake Piru is a picturesque lake with bold mountains rising from its shores and colorful wildflowers in the spring. A number of deep, inviting coves wind off from the main body of water. The lake is home to largemouth bass, rainbow trout, bluegill, channel catfish, and crappie.

Anglers like the quieter waters of Lake Piru compared to other regional lakes even if Piru doesn't have a reputation for record fish. Fishing boats can be rented at the marina.

5. Pyramid Lake: <u>https://water.ca.gov/What-We-Do/Recreation/Pyramid-Lake-Recreation</u> Pyramid Lake, located in the Angeles and Los Padres National Forests, is a reservoir formed by Pyramid Dam on Piru Creek, near Castaic, California. It is a hot spot for outdoor recreation and attracts thousands of visitors each year who soak up the sun and take in the lake's scenic beauty. The lake offers camping, picnicking, boating, waterskiing, and swimming. Fishing is a popular sport at Pyramid Lake, where you can catch fish such as large and small mouth striped bass, trout, catfish, blue gill, and crappie.

Gardens:

 Japanese Gardens: <u>www.thejapanesegarden.com</u> In the midst of the busy San Fernando Valley lies an oasis – a 6 1/2 acre garden, which features three gardens in one: a dry Zen meditation garden, a "wet-strolling" garden, and a tea garden.

Museums:

- 1. Air:
 - a. **Castle Air Museum**: <u>www.castleairmuseum.org</u> Home to over seventy restored vintage military aircraft ranging from pre-WWII to the present-day fighters, the Museum houses a fascinating collection of wartime memorabilia, uniforms, historic photos, and personal military artifacts from the past century. The Museum is proud to display the most complete lineage of Bomber Aircraft on the West Coast dating from prior WWII to the end of the Cold War spanning nearly 70 years.
 - b. Santa Monica Air Museum: www.museumofflying.org Originally established in 1974 as the Douglas Museum and Library, the Museum first opened in 19 at 2800 Airport Avenue. The Museum was founded by Donald Douglas Jr, the second President of the Douglas Aircraft Company. The collection consisted primarily of artifacts and the ephemera of Donald Wills Douglas Sr., the Founder and President of the Douglas Aircraft Company. In the late 1980's a discussion began between Donald Douglas Jr. and a local entrepreneur, David G. Price. It was agreed that a new building would be constructed on the north side of the Santa Monica Airport as the future location of the renamed Museum of Flying. The new Museum opened in 1989 with the original collection and the compliment of many vintage aircraft with an emphasis on World War II fighter aircraft.
 - c. **Palm Springs Air Museum**: <u>www.palmspringsairmuseum.org</u> The Palm Springs Air Museum is a living history museum dedicated to educating the public about the role Air Power played in preserving American liberties and way of life. The Museum

preserves, exhibits, and flies aircraft from World War Two, Korea, and the Vietnam Wars. Most of the aircraft are in flyable condition.

- d. Yanks Air Museum: <u>https://yanksair.org</u> Yanks Air Museum hosts one of the world's largest aircraft collections, most of them airworthy. Painstakingly rebuilding these titans of American aviation history is hard work, with mechanics and craftsmen working by hand (sometimes for decades) to return craft to their original state. Visitors are encouraged to view the aircraft and learn about their history, their stories, and their journey from graveyard to restoration.
- e. **Planes of Fame Air Museum**: <u>www.planesoffame.org</u> Every day at Planes of Fame Air Museum, you can experience history - both the reliving of it and the making of it. When one of our planes flies, for most it is a rare and wonderful thing to witness. Planes of Fame Air Museum has maintained a fleet of flyable historic aircraft for over 60 years! The Museum has operated these types of aircraft longer than the Army Air Corps or Air Force did. Planes of Fame Air Museum truly is where aviation history lives.
- f. **March Field Museum**: <u>www.marchfield.org</u> With over 30 acres of Outdoor Exhibit Space, and two large exhibit hangars, March Field Air Museum has the largest display of military aircraft in Southern California.
- g. Lyon Air Museum: www.lyonairmuseum.org Founded by Major General William Lyon, Lyon Air Museum is located on the west side of John Wayne Airport in Orange County, California. Lyon Air Museum is collocated with Martin Aviation, an awardwinning jet, turbo-prop and piston-powered aircraft repair facility established in 1923 by famed aviation pioneer Eddie Martin. The Lyon Air Museum exhibit is comprised of authentic aircraft, rare vehicles, and related memorabilia, with emphasis on the defining event of the 20th century – World War II. Through captivating and thought-provoking exhibits based in historical scholarship, visitors gain a better understanding of the important role the United States plays in shaping world history.

2. Art:

a. Los Angeles County Museum of Art: <u>www.lacma.org</u> Chris Burden's Urban Light, a piece made up of 202 cast-iron street lamps gathered from around L.A. and restored to working order, has quickly become one of the city's indelible landmarks. But you'd be selling yourself short if you don't venture beyond the photo-friendly installation; LACMA's collections boast modernist masterpieces, large-scale contemporary works (including Richard Serra's massive swirling sculpture and Burden's buzzing, hypnotic *Metropolis II*), traditional Japanese screens and by far L.A.'s most consistently terrific special exhibitions.

- a. Los Angeles Museum Of Contemporary Art Grand Avenue (MOCA): www.moca.org
- b. Getty Center: www.getty.edu/visit/center What's now called the Getty Villa (a coastal mansion filled with antiquities that's absolutely worth a visit, too) served as the decades-long home for the J. Paul Getty Trust's extensive art collection. But in 1997, the Getty Center opened. The result is a remarkable complex of travertine and white metal-clad pavilions that houses ornate French furniture, recognizable Impressionist pieces and rotating exhibitions. Its relative inaccessibility is more than compensated for by free admission and panoramic views, from the hills and the ocean in the west all the way around to Downtown in the east.
- c. Hammer Museum: <u>https://hammer.ucla.edu/</u> Industrialist Armand Hammer founded this museum in 1990, primarily to house his own collection, and it opened just three weeks before he died. Now, the free, UCLA partner institution stages fascinating shows of modern art, photography, and design, often with an emphasis on local artists. The shows are supplemented by Hammer's public events calendar (arguably one of the best in the city), chock full of free lectures, concerts and screenings.
- d. Huntington Library, Art Collections & Botanical Gardens: www.huntington.org The bequest of entrepreneur Henry E. Huntington is now one of the most enjoyable attractions in the Los Angeles region. It's also a destination that demands an entire day should you attempt to explore it in full: Between the art, the library holdings and the spreadeagled outdoor spaces, there's plenty to see, and most of it is best enjoyed at lingering leisure rather than as part of a mad day-long dash. From a Gutenberg Bible to an exquisitely landscaped Japanese garden, nearly every inch of the estate's grounds and collection is essential.
- e. **Museum of Latin American Art**: <u>https://molaa.org/</u> Located on land that once housed a productive silent film studio, everything about this museum is a forward-thinking enterprise, from its modern and contemporary-driven collection to its building. The core of the permanent collection is in the Long Gallery, with work by one artist from every Latin American country. Swing by on Sundays for free admission.

- f. Norton Simon Museum: https://www.nortonsimon.org The Norton Simon's Frank Gehry-helmed makeover in the late 1990s raised the museum's profile, but it also helped to expand the range of the museum's collection, giving it more space and creating a calm, simple environment. The museum is still best known for its impressive collection of Old Masters, notably pieces by 17th-century Dutch painters such as Rembrandt, Brueghel and Frans Hals. The French impressionists are represented by, among others, Monet, Manet and Renoir. After you've checked out the temporary shows, head into the excellent sculpture garden.
- g. The Broad: www.thebroad.org Three words: Infinity Mirror Rooms. Downtown's persistently popular contemporary art museum has two of Yayoi Kusama's immersive, mirror-laden rooms (and the standby queue to prove it). Elsewhere in the free museum, Eli and Edythe Broad's collection of 2,000 post-war works includes artists like Andy Warhol, Roy Lichtenstein, Ed Ruscha, Cindy Sherman, Barbara Kruger and Jeff Koons. Outside, the museum's plaza features a lovely olive tree grove that sits in from of <u>Otium</u>, the museum's signature restaurant from French Laundry alum Timothy Hollingsworth. Find out more in our complete guide to the Broad.

3. Automotive:

a. NHRA Motorspors Museum : <u>https://nhramuseum.org</u> The Museum mission is to celebrate the impact of motorsports on American culture. The Museum collects, preserves, exhibits, and interprets the vehicles, stories and artifacts that represent America's affection for, and the influence of, automotive speed and style in all its forms.

The Museum's collection includes dragsters, land speed vehicles, race cars, customs, hot rods, and a changing array of one-of-a-kind vehicles that tell the story of American hot rodding. We are located in a historic Art Deco style exposition building on the grounds of the Los Angeles County Fairplex, which is also home to Auto Club Raceway at Pomona. The National Hot Rod Association has had a continuous presence here since its very first event, the Southern California Championships, were held at this drag strip on an April weekend in 1953. Today, the NHRA starts its season here with the Winternationals and concludes the season with the Auto Club Finals.

b. **Nethercut Collection:** <u>http://www.nethercuttcollection.org/</u> The Nethercutt Museum showcases more than 130 of the world's greatest antique, vintage, classic and special interest automobiles including many top winners of the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

- c. Petersen Automotive Museum: <u>www.petersen.org/</u> Miracle Mile was the first commercial development in L.A. designed expressly for the benefit of drivers, and so a former department store makes an apt home for this museum of car culture. A 2015 redesign has since turned the automotive history museum into a high-tech gallery with about 150 cars on display. There's a glimpse into the rise of car culture in Southern California, but that mostly takes a backseat to a focus on the progress, dominance and dazzling good looks of the automobile. You'll find a mix of famous Hollywood cars, sumptuously swooping vintage vehicles and high-performance supercars.
- **d.** Motte Historical Car Museum: <u>www.mottemuseum.com</u> In 1951 John Victor Motte bought a Chevrolet Touring for \$15, overhauled the engine, and restored the car in the late 1970's. That Chevrolet was the car that began the private collection, and fueled the Motte Brothers desire to restore antique automobiles. The 1926 Chevrolet Touring is currently on display at the Museum, and the preservation of the rest of the restored automobiles continues today.

4. History:

a. Japanese American National Museum: <u>www.janm.org</u> This museum tells the story of Japanese immigration to the US, from early restrictions on property ownership to the brutal internment camps during World War II. Aside from the permanent exhibition, the museum stages an engaging roster of documentary and art exhibitions, including a wrenching yet beautiful display of images and artifacts from the internment camps. Recent exhibitions have ranged from an awe-inspiring showcase of Japanese tattoo traditions to a Hello Kitty retrospective.

5. Maritime Museums:

- a. Battleship USS Iowa. <u>www.pacificbattleship.com</u> Considered one of Los Angeles' best outdoor museums, Battleship USS Iowa features interactive programs focused on education, veterans, and community. Nicknamed the Battleship of President's, the iconic Navy ship saw action during WWII, Korean War, and the Cold War. We receive no government funding towards our operations. All admissions and donations go towards supporting our non-profit programs in education, veterans, and community.
- b. **USS Midway Aircraft Carrier Museum.** <u>www.midway.org</u> With more than 30 restored aircraft, and nearly 10 acres of exhibits and displays, the Midway brings you the most complete cross-section of carrier aviation in the world. From high up on the bridge down to the main engine room, taking you on a unique warship

journey that engages the sights, sounds, and aromas of this symbol of American freedom.

c. Maritime Museum of San Diego. <u>www.sdmaritime.org</u> The Maritime Museum of San Diego enjoys a worldwide reputation for excellence in restoring, maintaining and operating historic vessels. The museum has one of the world's finest collections of historic ships, including the world's oldest active ship Star of India. Our collection of ships and exhibits are available for daily public tours. One of the best things to do in San Diego!

6. Presidential Libraries

- a. Richard Nixon Presidential Library: <u>www.nixonfoundation.org</u> The presidential museum features 22 unique spaces that incorporate multimedia and interactive technologies. Visitors begin their journey in the new Malek Theater and enjoy a 13-minute orientation film before entering the permanent galleries in the "Wave of Change" gallery, which covers a period of great upheaval throughout the 1960s and during the months leading up to the November 1968 presidential election. Travel through President Nixon's presidency and resignation and return to his origins in the "Back to the Beginning" gallery. From there, travel through Nixon's life and his extraordinary accomplishments prior to becoming the 37th President of the United States. The journey ends with Richard Nixon's post-presidency period and his contributions as elder statesman, his impact on American culture, a solemn remembrance of Mr. and Mrs. Nixon's memorial services, and the short "Epilogue" film at the conclusion of the exhibit.
- b. Ronald Reagan Presidential Library: <u>www.reaganlibrary.gov</u> Perched on a mountaintop with sweeping views of the surrounding mountains, valleys and the Pacific Ocean, the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library is one of California's most beautiful and unique destinations. The Library's 300 acre site, about 45 miles from Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), represents the "shining city on a hill" often referenced by President Reagan and appropriately serves as the final resting place of the nation's 40th President.

7. Science:

a. **California Science Center**: <u>www.californiasciencecenter.org</u> Permanent exhibit galleries at this kid-friendly Exposition Park museum explore life sciences, human innovation and powered flight (all with a decidedly '90s design flair). But the real attraction here is the Space Shuttle *Endeavour*, which was very publicly paraded through L.A. to reach its temporary home at the Samuel Oschin Pavilion—a permanent structure slated to display the ship upright is in the works. While the

rest of the museum is free, *Endeavour* requires \$3 time tickets on weekends, a bargain to come face to face with one of this country's most iconic engineering marvels.

- b. Griffith Observatory: www.griffithobservatory.org The vista from this hilltop landmark is stunning, particularly at night when Los Angeles twinkles below. Inside you'll find a bevy of exhibits, including a Foucault pendulum (directly under Hugo Ballin's famed mural on the central rotunda), Tesla coil and planetarium show. Give yourself plenty of time before the 10pm closing to gaze through the 12-inch refracting telescope on the roof, otherwise you can look through the far less crowded modern, reflecting telescope on the front lawn.
- c. La Brea Tar Pits: www.tarpits.org Back in 1875, a group of amateur paleontologists discovered animal remains in the pits at Rancho La Brea, which bubbled with asphalt from a petroleum lake under what is now Hancock Park. Some 140-plus years later, the pros are still at work here, having dragged millions of fossils from the mire in the intervening years. Many of these specimens are now on display in this delightfully old-fashioned museum. Outside, the pits still bubble with black goo—you can watch paleontologists at work in the excavation of Pit 91 and toil away at the fossils waiting to be found as part of Project 23.
- d. **Natural History Museum of Los Angeles**: <u>www.nhm.org</u> The NHM's original Beaux Arts structure was the first museum building in L.A., opening in 1913 with Exposition Park itself. The more recent Otis Booth Pavilion welcomes visitors into the museum with a six-story glass entrance featuring a stunning, 63-foot-long fin whale skeleton. Highlights include the gem and mineral hall, spectacularly presented dinosaur and mammal fossils, the 3.5-acre urban nature gardens and "Becoming L.A.," which examines the Los Angeles region's history from Native Americans to the present day.
- e. Southern California Children's Museum: <u>www.socalkids.org</u> We're in the era of experiences! Southern California Children's Museum provides play-based activities designed to foster excitement and spark a real sense of wonder. This isn't a park. It's much more than the zoo. Whether interacting with a fire engine, getting a little dirty in a construction zone, or experiencing what it's like to perform at the Hollywood Bowl—SCCM exhibits are here to create more for kids who, let's face it, deserve more.

- 8. Train:
 - a. Southern California Railway Museum: <u>www.socalrailway.org</u> Explore the West's largest collection of railway locomotives, passenger and freight cars, streetcars, interurban electric cars, buildings and other artifacts dating from the 1870's. Ride streetcars, interurban electric cars, and trains on the Museum railway. Visit the Museum's collection of more than 200 streetcars and railway vehicles to experience the early days of electric, steam, and diesel railway transportation in and around Los Angeles.
 - b. Pacific Southwest Railway Museum: <u>www.psrm.org</u> The Pacific Southwest Railway Museum Association is a non-profit educational organization dedicated to the preservation and interpretation of railroads as they existed in the Pacific Southwest. With over 120 pieces of equipment and artifacts on display between our two facilities in Campo, CA and La Mesa, CA, the Pacific Southwest Railway Museum Association provides a unique learning experience for all ages. At our Campo facility, we offer vintage train rides with locomotives and cars from the early 20th century operated by our all-volunteer train crews and support staff.
 - c. San Bernadino History and Railway Museum: <u>www.sbdepotmuseum.com</u> The San Bernardino History and Railroad Museum specializes in San Bernardino history and all things railroad. It houses the Santa Fe Western Archives and unique artifacts, surrounded by hundreds of historic photographs.The Museum is located in the restored 1918 Santa Fe Depot that serves Amtrak and Metrolink passengers and is across the tracks from the BNSF intermodal facility. Over 100 freight trains pass by the depot each day.
 - d. South Coast Railroad Museum: www.goletadepot.org The South Coast Railroad Museum in Goleta, California, focuses on the history, technology, and adventure of railroading. Special emphasis is placed on the railroad's contributions to local history, on the Southern Pacific Railroad, and on the key historical role of the railroad depot in rural community life across America. The museum centerpiece is Goleta Depot, a country railroad station house built by the Southern Pacific in 1901 during completion of the Coast Route joining San Francisco and Los Angeles. Goleta Depot is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.
 - e. **Travel Town Train Museum**: <u>www.traveltown.org</u> The mission of the Foundation is to educate the public about railroad history as it pertains to the development of the Southwest Region of the United States, particularly the Los Angeles area. We fulfill this mission by supporting the restoration, operation, and interpretation of

the historic railroad equipment at the City-operated Travel Town Museum in Griffith Park.

f. Lomita Railway Museum: www.lomita-rr.org The Museum was built in 1966. Much research and study was given to depot structures before the final home for the Museum was chosen. Mrs. Lewis chose to copy the Boston & Maine's Greenwood Station at Wakefield, Massachusetts, which was built before the turn of the century. The Museum has been referred to as a "work of art". Everyone who worked on the building was an artist in his line. This of course includes John W. Gallareto, the designer and builder. No expense was spared to produce a proper and appropriate treasury to house the valuable historical items on display in the Museum.

Zoos / Aquariums

- 1. **Big Bear Alpine Zoo**: <u>www.bigbearalpinezoo.org</u> 42801 Moonridge Rd, Big Bear Lake, CA 92315
- 2. **Birch Aquarium at Scripps**: <u>www.aquarium.ucsd.edu</u>. More than 350 species of marine you'll normally see in waters from the cold Pacific Northwest to the warm tropical reefs of the South Pacific are located in the Birch Aquarium, showcased in 46 tanks ranging in size from a 70,000-gallon and less. Set against a breathtaking view of the blue Pacific, the Birch Aquarium at Scripps is home to an artificial kelp forest, too. The aquarium also features a man-made tide pool that stimulates an awareness in visitors of the fragility of San Diego's intertidal environments. This coastal facility is also home to the country's largest oceanographic museum. Hands-on exhibits educate visitors about the ocean, earth sciences, and more. It hosts annual events focused on marine animals.
- 3. The Living Desert: <u>www.livingdesert.org</u> 47900 Portola Ave, Palm Desert, CA 92260
- 4. Long Beach Aquarium: <u>www.aquariumofpacific.org</u> Connect with the ocean and each other for a sustainable future for all with the Aquarium's unique programming, including guest speakers series, online programs, policy forums, art and science events, community science, responsible seafood initiatives, cultural festivals, and diversity outreach. Explore our outdoor exhibits, including sharks, penguins, seals and sea lions, lorikeets and the ray, moon jelly, sharks, and horseshoe crab touch areas.
- 5. Los Angeles Zoo: <u>www.lazoo.org</u> The Los Angeles Zoo is located in the heart of the nation's second-largest city. Each year 1.3 million visitors pass through the gates to view a collection of 1,200 animals from around the world. The Los Angeles Zoo opened in November 1966. Several of the animals that were in the Zoo on opening day: elephant

Gita, alligator Methuselah, Indian rhino Herman. The L.A. Zoo was the first major zoo in the United States to bar visitors from feeding the animals.

- 6. San Diego Zoo: www.sandiegozoowildlifealliance.org The 100-acre Zoo was founded in 1916, by a colorful and extremely enterprising local physician, Dr. Harry Wegeforth. He gathered a collection of 50 animals from various local menageries and hired a single keeper named Army, "who had one arm but it was all he needed." Today the Zoo cares for 3,800 animals (800 different species) and employs 115 individuals to care for them. The total staff numbers more than 1,000. The Zoo has opened several new natural habitats in recent years: Tiger River, Sun Bear Forest, Scripps Aviary, Gorilla Tropics, Pygmy Chimpanzees, Raptors, Australasian Birds, Hippo Beach, and Polar Bear Plunge. And of course you'll want to see the two important visitors that now reside at the Panda Research Station.
- 7. San Diego Safari Park: <u>www.sdzsafaripark.org</u> Located 32 miles northeast of the Zoo, the Wild Animal Park is 20 times larger and an entirely different experience! This 1,800-acre wildlife preserve was established in 1969 under the directorship of Dr. Charles Schroeder. It opened to the public in 1972, and allows visitors to view herds of exotic animals s they might occur in their native homelands of Africa or Asia. The Wgasa Bush Line, a silent electronic monorail, skirts the edge of the Savannah and offers five miles of unobstructed views of elephants, antelope, rhinos, and giraffes. Soon to open is Heart of Africa which will offer guests the opportunity to take a walking safari for an even closer view.
- 8. Santa Ana Zoo: <u>www.santaanazoo.org</u> Today the Santa Ana Zoo at Prentice Park is a nationally accredited public zoological garden occupying a unique urban site in the heart of Orange County. Situated on approximately 20 acres, the zoo is an intimate urban oasis for animals and people. It features South American plants and wildlife; the only zoo in the country to focus exclusively on this region. The Santa Ana Zoo at Prentice Park is committed to providing recreation and education while bringing the message of conservation to the zoo's many visitors. It is a place to have fun, a place to learn, and a place that can be enjoyed by people of all ages every day of the year.
- 9. Santa Barbara Zoo and Gardens: www.sbzoo.org The beginning was modest with only a few animals a llama, two sheep, a goat, a turkey and a pair of spider monkeys but the potential was there in an incredibly beautiful location. The Zoo grew, always emphasizing quality rather than quantity, and soon became one of the most popular attractions in the City of Santa Barbara. Building the Zoo was a community effort. Masses of volunteers dedicated their time while local businesses contributed materials and supplies for everything from pathways to paperwork. Many of the original volunteers and contributors are still very much involved with the Zoo today. Also during the decade of the 70's, landscaping material, much of it donated, continued to be added to the park and

zoo areas. Beautiful gardens were emerging. The Zoo took on a tropical atmosphere, highlighting some magnificent specimen plantings, especially palm trees. The entire lower end of the park had been marshy and only one lone eucalyptus tree grew there when the Zoo was opened. Now visitors wind their way through coral trees, jacarandas, silk trees, bananas and giant bird of paradise. Plantings in and around exhibits compliment the animals.

10. Sea World San Diego: <u>www.seaworld.com/san-diego</u> SeaWorld[®] San Diego ranks in the top 10 theme parks in California. SeaWorld not only features thrill rides and amusements, it also offers many family fun shows with sea mammals, oceanic creatures and lots of things for kids to enjoy in a kid-friendly, vacation destination theme park in San Diego, California. SeaWorld sits next to Mission Bay with many attractions, shops and restaurants overlooking Mission Bay. The setting is spectacular for this family fun attraction.

NTPS Symposiums

NTPS students who are here for at least one year have the opportunity to attend two SETP meetings. One symposium is held at the end of September in Anaheim. The other event is near the end of March location TBD. NTPS pays attendance fees and hotel accommodations for long course students. You are welcome to bring your families to these events. Exact dates and attendance information will be given out prior to each event.

SETP- Anaheim. Meets at the end of September. Meetings for the students last approx. 2 ½ days from 0830 to approx. 1630 Thursday and Friday and approx. 0830 to approx. 1200 on Saturday. Spouses and children are encouraged to attend the 3-day event but they are not registered to attend in the daily symposium meetings. Wednesday evening there is a cocktail party for attendees and a guest. (sorry, no children) Friday there is a dinner and cocktail party for SETP members and guests. This event is not usually included in the student's pre-paid symposium fee.

During the student symposiums, spouses and children may visit Disneyland, hang out at the hotel pool or sightsee in the local area. Disneyland/California Adventure Park opens its doors at 0930 to all hotel guests. You may purchase your own tickets in advance online, or buy at the front gate. The entrance to the park is within walking distance from the hotel. You will be able to enter and exit as many times as you want on the day of your ticket. September can be very hot, 85F/30C, so bring sun lotion and appropriate clothing. I would recommend to bring bathing suits, in event of the desire to go swimming. Also, your room may have a small refrigerator but NO cooking facilities. I strongly recommend that you bring snack foods and drinks because of the theme park, the prices are generally very expensive.

<u>Climate</u>

Lancaster, Palmdale, Quartz Hill, Rosamond, and Mojave: Summer is very dry and hot. Temperatures range between 90 and 110 degrees F (32-43 degrees C). Spring is sometimes rainy with high winds. Temperatures range between 55-85 degrees F (12-29 degrees C). Winter can be mild, cold, rainy, or windy with temperatures between 25-55 degrees F (-3-12 degrees C). Fall starts out mild but can turn cold and windy. Temperatures range between 40-75 degrees F (4-23 degrees C) and the sun shines almost every day on the Antelope Valley.

Tehachapi's year-round temperature is generally 10 degrees cooler. Summers are warm to moderately hot with a temperature range from 60-100 degrees F (15-38 degrees C). Spring is cool and windy with temperatures between 45-68 degrees F (8-20 degrees C). Winter is cold with some snow, ice, freezing, rain, and fog. Temperatures can range between 14-50 degrees F (-10-10 degrees C). Fall is cool, mostly sunny temperatures between 41-77 degrees F (5-25 degrees C). Tehachapi experiences four very distinct seasons.

Leaving NTPS

If your living situation is in an apartment contracted by the National Test Pilot School, NTPS and the apartment management kindly request that you leave the apartment in approximately the same condition that it was when you arrived.

This means that you must remove everything from the apartment that you brought in. The refrigerator must be emptied, and all closets, cabinets, and drawers. Look under beds and behind large furniture for small items. Take all the trash to the bins provided by the apartment complex.

You are not required to scrub the walls unless you or your children have left obvious marks. You are not required to do a "spotless" cleaning of the kitchen, bathrooms, or refrigerator. Leave these areas as clean as you would normally keep them. Also, you do not need to worry about carpet cleaning, the apartment management will take care of the particulars. Please "spot" clean any areas that you are responsible for.

Please take care of the furniture and remove any marks that you or your family has made.





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
Antelope Valley Map



Lancaster "East" Map




Lancaster "West" Map




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Palmdale "East" Map
